REFLECTIONS FROM MARY

We had been traveling in the mountains for 8 hours when the road ended; it literally stopped. We could see a few scattered homes in the distance with grass for rooftops, the clear blue sky and mountains beyond mountains...we had arrived in Digger the end of the world, it seemed. Perched at 14,000 feet in the Himalayas between India and Pakistan, they call this the disputed lands.

This village of about 300 people has a tiny school for kindergarten through 8th grade. They bring teachers from the cities to teach a mandatory rotation for 2 years. Most teachers grit their teeth and put up with the harsh conditions to keep their jobs. Times are tough. Some teachers don't last the full 2 years.

Most of the windows in the school are broken, letting in the frosty air. There is no electricity or running water. There is no cafeteria, no water fountains, basketball courts, or lockers. The children sit on broken desks or on the floor, wearing their knitted hats to ward off the cold air. They smile and cut up, the way all kids do, joking with each other and sharing the meager school supplies and toys.



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They gather each morning to recite the national anthem and pledge allegiance to the state, standing at attention and using their loudest voices. Some of them, very few, will travel to the nearest city, Leh, to continue their education through high school. Most will not have learned enough in the primary grades to be accepted in Leh.

We spent time with teachers, gaining insight into the challenges of teaching without supplies or support. We encouraged them and gave tips on teaching methods and values education, hoping to instill a sense of pride and urgency into their lessons. We also repaired windows, roofs and desks. We even built a small bookshelf to house the dozen or so books they had on hand. We played soccer and tag with the kids, handed out knitted hats and gave plenty of high fives.

They taught us too. I learned about tenacity and determination from the teachers willing to leave their homes and make do with very little in order to feed their families and give education a chance at survival in this tiny village. I had the chance to take part in the community carrying wheat from the crops and separating it from the chaff as I worked as a farmer for a day. We ate together in the fields and shared barley mush and Himalayan tea. I learned about extreme hospitality as these villagers

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shared their limited resources and their harvested bounty with us in the village hall. I was humbled by their extravagant celebrations and festive dancing in our honor.

Most of all, I learned that there are people who have been forgotten by the rest of the world. They live on the edges—without a Bible in their own language, without the comfort of prayer, without knowing the security of an all-loving, merciful God. But I know that God has not forgotten them. I hope that they will learn this too.



"But how can they ask Him to save them unless they believe in Him? And how can they believe in Him if they have never heard about Him? And how can they hear about Him unless someone tells them?" Romans 10:14
